## THE THINGS WE LEARNED

The windows are pushed up to let in that fresh breeze, the doors are swinging open. Pathways and sidewalks are growing more crowded by the day with hikers and joggers and bikers, lovers holding hands (yes, holding hands!) and proud parents with strollers introducing their babies to the world. The roads have more traffic, the stores are starting to open, friends are tentatively setting up dates and weddings, namings, and *B'nei Mitzvah* are starting to reappear on our calendars.

No, the COVID-19 crisis is not quite over. We're still taking precautions, making wise decisions, and washing our hands raw. We still give that person who just sneezed a quick look that says both "gesundheit" and "thank you for covering your mouth and nose." (Of course, the look is most decidedly different when the sneezer/cougher did not cover up!). But we are also starting to see the first real hints of life moving out of isolation. No, we may not exactly get back to "normal" anytime soon. Then again, after what we have been through, "normal" just isn't good enough anymore.

Each of us has a list of the things we missed most during these months of sequester. The lists reflect the people and experiences we most cherish. In turn, the lists teach us important insights about our values and our choices. These are the lessons learned from the Spring of 2020, the crisis that forced us to see the world not solely with our eyes but also to gain a new perspective on life with our hearts and souls.

There is a curious line in the Talmud (*Ta'anit* 8b):

*Rabbi Yitzchak said: A blessing is found only in an object that is hidden [samui] from the eye. As it is stated: "Adonai will command blessing upon you in your barns [ba'asamekha]" (Deuteronomy 28:8).*

Rabbi Yitzchak's insight is based on a subtle word play on *samui* (hidden) and *asamekha* (your barns). His message is also subtle: that is, we may look for blessings in the things our eyes desire but God's blessings are most often found in the hidden treasures of home and hearth.

This pandemic has made us more aware of the blessings that are waiting for us "hidden in plain sight," in our homes and with our families and friends.

Indeed, I'm sure that not one of us will ever take for granted again the times we can visit with our loved ones. As soon as it is safe again, we'll hug and embrace and kiss faces tearing with joy and relief. At meals we'll talk and laugh so much that we'll hardly notice the food. We'll get on planes and travel

to see those who we longed to touch. We'll look long into faces that we feared we'd never be able to see up close again. We'll throw parties to celebrate delayed graduations, weddings, birthdays, anniversaries and *B'nei Mitzvah*. We'll gather to remember those we lost and were unable to honor in a fitting manner. And we'll pledge sacred oaths never again to take for granted our hidden blessings.

When at last the crisis is over, we'll sit together at services to celebrate life, love, health and faith . . . and utter the most heartfelt prayers not with words but with the simple acts of looking over at those we love, pressing gently on hands and sighing a deep thanksgiving to God that we really are here, once again, blessedly together.

*Ken yehi ratzon*, May it be God's will that we will soon be healthy, happy and together! Oh, how I miss my loved ones and how I miss each of you!

## IT'S WHAT YOU MAKE OF IT

Shakshuka is a tomato based egg dish. Its origins are complicated, its not as easy as saying that burgers are American and pasta is Italian (though that one is up for debate as well). In Maghreb, a region of Northwest Africa, there was a common dish called saksuka. It was made of cooked vegetables and either minced meat of sheep's liver. Beyond Maghreb, there were tomato based stews popular all over the Ottoman Empire, including the Turkish menemen, a tomato pepper stew with lightly beaten eggs that was similar to a thick omelet. Jews in the Maghreb region referenced this Turkish menemen (and its other iterations from around the Ottoman Empire) along with their meat saksuka and began to cook a vegetarian version that for kashrut purposes was pareve, neither meat nor dairy. At this time, the Maghreb region began to call these variant dishes shakshuka as opposed to saksuka. There were always many versions of shakshuka; the Tunisians tended to make a more fiery, spicy shakshuka as opposed to the more mild flavor profile preferred by the Moroccans. Algerians served their version of shakshuka over a semolina flatbread. Others opted for a hunk of bread ripped off the loaf to sop up the tomato sauce. As Jews from these countries began to immigrate to Israel, they brought shakshuka with them; when you

immigrate to another country, you can only bring so much with you but your flavors and the recipes remembered in your head and your heart weigh nothing and take up no space in your bag. Shakshuka became wildly popular in Israel as a breakfast, lunch and dinner. It was a practical fit for the culture; kibbutzim and moshavim had large scale egg production, it didn't require much of a kitchen or fancy ingredients and it was easy, quick and cheap to make. And of course, it was delicious and filled your belly for a day of work. Shakshuka became a staple of Israeli cuisine, now most commonly made as a tomato base, often with cooked peppers, with whole eggs layered on top and cooked through the sauce.

Shakshuka is emblematic of the entirety of Israeli cuisine – it is defined by the fact that it has no real definition, that it is a mishmash of cultures and customs that come together into something delicious. Liel Leibovitz, a senior writer at Tablet, writes, “So what if the Moroccans make it, too. Never mind that Tunisians eat it for breakfast each weekend, or that it delights the Greeks and satiates the Algerians: Shakshuka is Israeli now. In fact, it's Israeli because, not in spite, of its widespread popularity across the Middle East. As Jews huddled for safety in their biblical homeland, fleeing violence in Rabat or Tunis or Algiers, they could take

comfort in one thing: s i m m e r -

ing onions, peppers, and tomatoes, topped with a couple of eggs, cooked on a skillet and consumed with a fresh loaf of white bread. It was what home tasted like, no matter where home happened to be.”

Shakshuka is, by definition, what you make of it. I make my shakshuka with broccoli and mushrooms in my tomato sauce. My secret touch (which I suppose is now not so secret) is that I caramelize onions in a separate pan, chop and mash them into an onion jam and then place a generous spoonful on the surface of the tomato sauce, just under each egg. Everyone has their way of doing it and none are wrong.

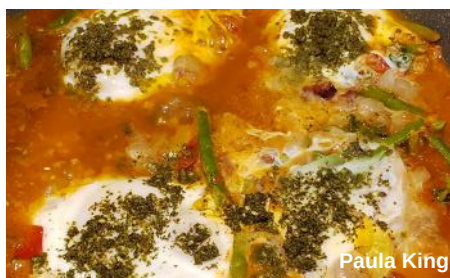

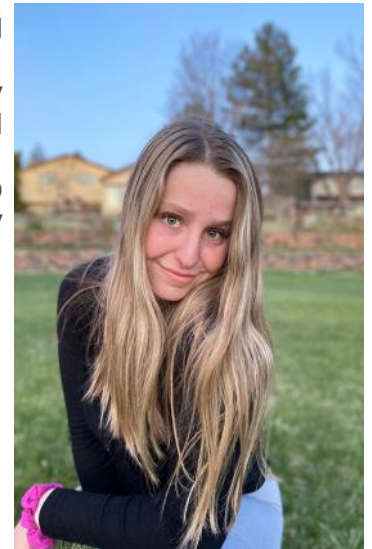
