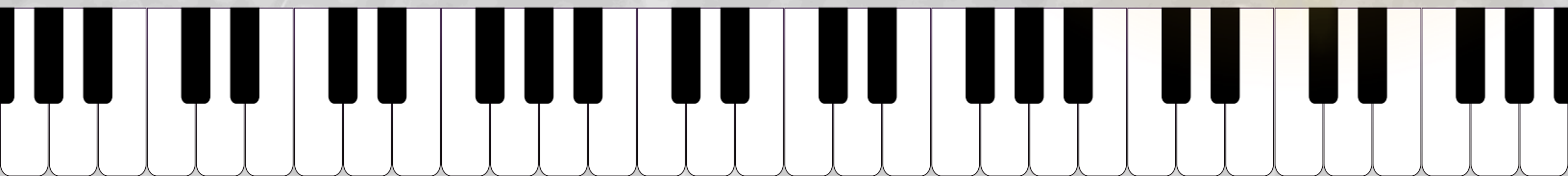

# THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE “YOMS” RABBI RICK RHEINS

Yom in Hebrew means “day.” Something that is described as “yom-yom” is “daily occurrence.” And then, of course, there are days that are very special, which we call a “yom tov” or in Yiddish, a “yontif.” For the most part, we would use yom tov or yontif in reference to a Festival observance, specifically Pesach (Passover), Shavuot, and Sukkot. But over the past century, the Jewish people have created three new “Yoms”, which we will celebrate this year in May: Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Memorial Day); Yom HaZikaron (Israel Memorial Day); and Yom HaAztmaut (Israel Independence Day). There will be community observances of each of the “Yoms” in Denver and Temple Sinai is honored to host Yom HaZikaron on Sunday, May 12 at 7:00pm.

These new “Yoms” have added significance for us this year. On October 7, Simchat Torah, a Yom Tov, Palestinian terrorists led by Hamas attacked Israel and murdered over 1,200 innocent people, many of whom were young people attending a music festival. The Palestinians then kidnapped hundreds of Israelis and, to this date, still hold around 200 people as hostages and as human shields. The Palestinian pogrom on October 7 was the deadliest attack against Jews since the Holocaust. Recently, on April 6, Iran fired over 300 missiles and killer drones against Israel. The threats to annihilate Jews are not idle boasts by fringe sickos. Rather, the perpetrators mean what they say and have no hesitation carrying out their threats.

Unfortunately, there are those around the world, including here in the United States, who enthusiastically support these deadly attacks against Jews and Israel. It is shockingly ironic that many of the pro-Palestinian protestors opening call for death to Jews and the destruction of Israel, and yet they accuse Israel of genocide. The vast majority of leaders in this country and around the world see through the cynical and vicious twisting of truth by the antisemitic mobs that are rioting on campuses, shutting down roads and bridges, and harassing public meetings. The vast majority of the American people recognize that the radical leftist pro-Palestinian Hamas protestors are simply another in the long line of those like Al-Qaeda, Isis, Islamic Jihad, the Iranian Revolutionaries, and anarchists, who seek to destroy both America and Israel. The far-leftists are unlikely allies of the far-right Klan, neo-Nazis, and other fringe groups that are equally violent and seek to bring down this country. Their evil intent is not just a Civil War movie fantasy.

*So this year, Yom HaShoah, the Holocaust Memorial observance, will be much more than remembrance of the past. We now know that our promise “Never Again” will have to be backed up with action.*

*And this year, when we observe Yom HaZikaron at Temple Sinai and consider the brave men and women who died in defense of Israel or who were murdered in terrorist attacks, we know that the threats to Israel's security still present an on-going struggle.*

*And when we gather on Sunday, May 5 to celebrate Yom HaAztmaut, the State of Israel's 76th birthday, we will know with more conviction than ever that we cannot take for granted Israel's security and wellbeing.*

*Your prayers, your support, and your action are blessings that are needed more than ever.*

Too many of those heroes paid the ultimate price. Their lives should never be taken for granted. Let this Memorial Day weekend be a time of reflection, gratitude, and remembrance of those who gave their lives for our freedoms. Representatives of our Jewish War Veterans post will make a special presentation.



# COUNTING IS IMPORTANT RABBI MICHAEL SHIELDS

Judaism embraces a tradition of counting; from the number of days during creation to the number of Israelites who left Egypt, from the number of commandments to the number of years we wandered in the wilderness. Just a few years ago we found ourselves in the uncertain and unknown expanse of COVID. We experienced loss, grief, fatigue and so much more. We also found new ways to connect to one another. We were resilient, and now we journey forward with some wisdom and strength collected in that wilderness journey.

Today, as individuals, families, and as a Jewish community - part of Am Yisrael, the People of Israel, we find ourselves again in the wilderness. Since October 7, Jews in Israel, around the world, and right here in the United States have been faced with ongoing uncertainty. We continue to count the growing number of attacks that our college students face and the often lackluster and inadequate responses from their universities. It could be easy to give in to despair.

However, there is hope. There are wells of sustenance from which to draw hope. During these times we can look to our 4000 year old tradition for guidance and draw lessons from the Counting of the Omer.

From Passover to Shavuot, God commands us to count each day for a total of fifty days, called the omer. Saturday May 25 is the 33rd day of the Omer, called Lag B'omer, a day of special celebration. We learn in the Talmud (Yevamot 61b) that during the omer over 1500 years ago, a plague afflicted the students of Rabbi Akiva. As a result, some follow the tradition to refrain from cutting hair or shaving-mourning rituals for those who died.

Legend teaches that on the 33rd day of the omer the plague lifted and we celebrate this time period with bonfires and rejoicing. The students of Rabbi Akiva were in a period of mourning leading up that day. We too have been counting since October 7. We are all in need of Lag B'omer more than ever. We pray for and need for that time to come when the insidious plague will lift and we can rejoice that the captives, long-held, have been returned, that the enemies of Israel have been vanquished, and that peace has returned to the land.

We know that all of the problems that plague us in our wildernesses will not magically end on Lag B'omer but we can take this time to patiently wait for but also actively work towards a more hopeful and safe time. We can find reasons to count the blessings we do have in our lives and express gratitude. We can use our wellsprings of hope to power us forward individually and communally. It is important to count the many ways that we are not just surviving, but thriving.

Sinai students are becoming b'nei mitzvah in our sanctuary. Our Confirmation students will read from our Holocaust Torah scroll. Our Youth Choir members are blessing us with their beautiful voices and our adult choir members are beginning to whistle and hum the High Holy Day melodies that will lift our prayers to the heavens in just a few short months, and the Temple Sinai professional team and clergy are in the beginning planning stages for the Days of Awe. In the summer months we will welcome our first Shabbat services in our new outdoor space and the Temple Sinai Brotherhood softball teams will take to the diamond to compete against our Jewish brethren from around the Denver area.

Counting the Omer, the days of the week, month, year, and more allows us to not only separate different time periods but also different stages in our lives. We count the years since we lost a loved one, since we have been afflicted with disease, or since a moment that transformed our lives forever, and we also count and celebrate the number of years of our lives, how long we have worked at a specific place, the time we have spent with our beloveds.

Each year our counting of the Omer and the retelling of the story of Rabbi Akiva reminds us that better days lie ahead. It will continue to take patience, courage, community and faith, but we will arrive at Sinai together. As we look ahead to Lag B'omer, Shavuot, and the upcoming New Year, I relish opportunities to deepen our bonds; gather together, learn together, and pray together. I wish you all health, peace, courage and comfort as we count together.

# RAY ZWERIN

## RABBI EMERITUS

Finally, after smoothing out the bumps, my blog-newsletter of offerings is up and ready to be viewed. If you like what you see, please subscribe. It's free. Or if you want to help with the costs, you are welcome to contribute.

### So, you ask, what can I find there?

**Sermons:** The Introduction to my book, Forty Years of Wondering: The High Holy Day Sermons of Rabbi Raymond A. Zwerin, plus a few of those 100 sermons from each decade (1960s - 2000s) narrated by me. So far, there are a number of sermons posted, and more will be added every so often.

**Life Stories:** Unusual weddings, odd happenings at funerals, unexpected happenings while conducting worship services in synagogues during our travels abroad, miscellaneous happenings to our family (such as extortion by a wannabe member of the American Nazi Party), etc. There are 47 such tales waiting to be posted. A few already are. Some events are tweaked to protect the innocent; all names removed. Each story is unique. Rabbis don't lead uneventful lives.

**Spain:** Rikki and I spent a number of weeks traveling through this unusual country by car looking for the Sephardic roots of our families, and came across much about the past and much about the present that is of interest. Over 20 cities were on our itinerary, each with its unique history, and each with its account of relationships between Jews and Muslims in southern Andalusia and with Catholics in the north -- Golden Ages to the Inquisition. It's part history, part travelogue, part novel. Seville and Gibraltar are the first posting. More on the way.

**Teachings:** I have given lectures around the country on numerous topics literally from A to Z ("Angels: What and Why?" ~ "Zodiac: A Jewish Calendar?"), and have taught Melton and OLLI courses for decades on countless subjects. The first lecture of a course called "Controversies in Judaism" is posted. It's a long read, but there is a Summary if you're a short reader.

**More:** Ultimately, I expect to post my novels (published and unpublished), a history of our outstanding Jewish educational book company, ARE Publishing, Inc., and along the way some thoughts, concerns, possibilities, projects, responses to questions, you get the idea. Will there be interviews? Not now, or as Franz Rosenzweig might have said, not yet.

# SHEILA PURDIN DIRECTOR, EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION



Temple Sinai Preschool is grounded by a strong kehillah/community that is supported by volunteer leadership, specifically our Parent Teacher Organization (PTO). Our PTO is co-chaired by Rachel Baum and Kirsten Chod. Rachel and Kirsten answered the call to lead the organization while also agreeing to participate in a four month Community of Practice (CoP) sponsored by The Efshar Project to prepare for the job. It was a huge commitment, with the understanding that they would be at the helm of the PTO for at least two years. I recently asked Kirsten and Rachel to tell us about their work as Temple Sinai Preschool PTO co-chairs.

### **What inspired you to co-chair Temple Sinai Preschool Parent Teacher Organization (PTO)?**

We are both passionate about creating community for young families. After COVID, our PTO was, in a sense, starting over from scratch. We were excited to create a framework for how to operate the PTO, and make it sustainable so future leaders would have a solid foundation upon which to build.

### **What has been most rewarding for you as PTO co-chairs?**

Temple Sinai Preschool is known for its incredible community - friendly "hellos" in the hallways, classroom playdates, events that allow families to get to know one another - we have so many families who genuinely want to connect with one another, so our role is just to create opportunities for them to do so! It has been rewarding to create new events that foster a greater sense of community within our school. We implemented class/grade breakfasts on mornings when the preschool opened late for professional development training. We held a number of "Walk and Talks" where we met on the highline canal after drop-off and walked together. Along with so many other events our PTO has been orchestrating for years, all our programs help foster a greater sense of community within our school.

Our role has allowed us to bridge the home/school connection not only for our other PTO volunteers and families, but for ourselves as well. Showing our children that our school is a part of our extended family is so meaningful and has been incredibly rewarding for us.

### **What are you most proud of in your first year leading the PTO?**

We have put so much work into creating a framework for our PTO that is sustainable. We're proud of how often we are complimented on our organization and clear communication, and we're proud our work has paid off!

### **What are your goals for PTO next year?**

Our goal for next year is to grow our parent involvement and provide more opportunities, both large and small, for families to be involved and get connected. We spent this past year creating the flyers, communication methods, and new program ideas. This coming year we can have more fun marketing our events and volunteer opportunities and less time mapping out the logistics!

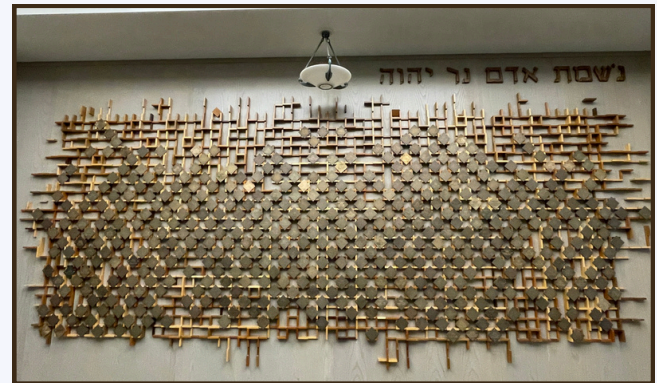
## BRICK-BY-BRICK PROJECT

## TREE OF LIFE

The Tree of Life sculpture was created by the renowned synagogue artist Sanford Werfel. The branches of the tree form the Hebrew words "Etz Chaim." The stones at the roots of the Tree are symbolic of the Twelve Tribes of Israel. The golden leaves and stones may be inscribed to highlight or commemorate joyous occasions, including births, weddings, anniversaries, graduations or to honor family, parents or friends. Cost: \$175 to inscribe a leaf and \$1,000 to inscribe a stone.
