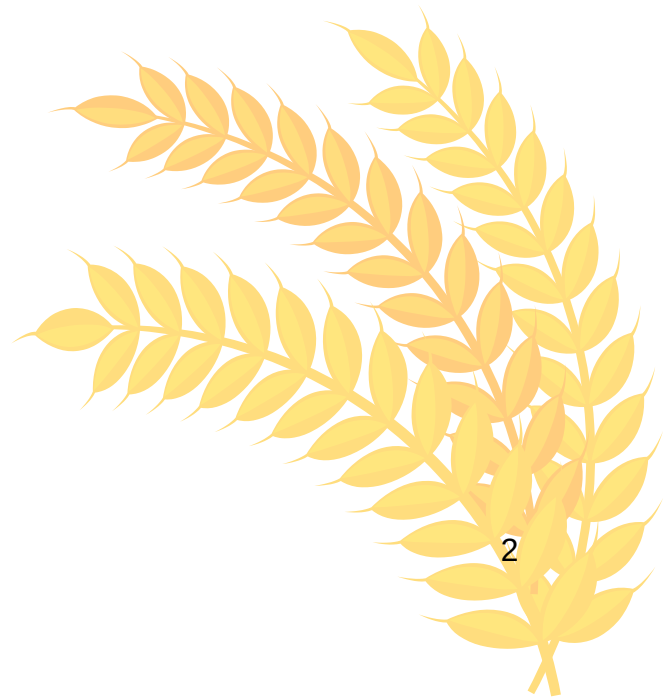

REMEMBRANCE, REFLECTION, AND RENEWAL (IT'S THE STORY OF OUR PEOPLE)

RABBI RICK RHEINS

April ushers in several very important Jewish holidays and observances that at first glance are totally unrelated but form a perfect expression of the essence and spirit of Judaism and the Jewish people. Each of these special and sacred days will be observed with services and programs at Temple Sinai. This issue of the Keshet is packed with dates, times, and details about each one. But in what way are these different observances related to one another? Let me share a few thoughts on this with you.

Passover, which begins Saturday evening, April 12, is the seminal experience of Judaism that marks our liberation from Egyptian slavery and the beginning of our people's journey: becoming a nation, receiving the inspiration of Torah, and preparing to enter the Promised Land of Israel. How fitting it is that this sacred observance is inclusive for all our family regardless of age. All have a role at the Seder. We strive for each person to feel personally connected to the redemption from slavery and the gift of freedom.

Just a few days after Passover concludes, we observe **Yom HaShoah**, Holocaust Memorial Day. This year marks 80 years since the liberation of Auschwitz and the end of the Holocaust. On Wednesday, April 23 we participate with the entire community in the annual ADL Governor's Holocaust memorial program (5:30-7:00 PM at Emanuel).

A few days after Yom HaShoah, the community will come together for **Yom HaZikaron**, the Memorial Day for Israeli soldiers. This moving program will be our opportunity to honor the sacrifice of the men and women who created and protected the Jewish homeland of Israel. This year's community observance will be held at the JCC on Tues. April 29.

Yom HaAtzmaut, Israel's Independence Day, is Thursday, May 1. Temple Sinai will have a special Lunch & Learn program (noon) to commemorate this happy day. On Erev Shabbat, May 2nd, we will celebrate Israel during services followed by an Israeli themed Shabbat dinner.

And on Sunday, May 4, we will participate in JEWISHcolorado's annual **Israel Walk and Festival**. The program is from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM at the Great Lawn Park (101 Yosemite Street).

So, in what way do Passover, Yom HaShoah, Yom HaZikaron, and Yom HaAtzmaut relate to one another? They all tell parts of the story of Jewish survival and our indomitable spirit of creation and celebration of life even after tragedy. After slavery we did not merely achieve freedom. Rather, we also found the inspiration of Torah and the creation of Israel, our ancestral Jewish homeland.

After the Holocaust we did not simply survive. Rather, we found the strength to finally re-establish Israel as a modern nation. We created the links and pathways for the remnant of the Jewish people scattered across Europe and the Middle East to come home to freedom, safety, and dignity in Israel. So it is with Yom HaZikaron that we pause to reflect on the selfless sacrifice of so many Israelis who fought to build and protect that haven for our people. And Yom HaAtzmaut parallels Passover as a celebration of freedom and hope for a blessed future.

Jews, like all people, suffer tragedies and setbacks. Our stories are detailed in the holiest of books and in the annals of history. Indeed, the story of the Jewish people has inspired billions of people of different faiths and nations who relate to our traditions of remembrance, reflection, and renewal. And to that chronicle of our ever-unfolding Jewish story is your personal journey and that of your family.

With every Jewish observance, your personal story is woven into the fabric of our sacred history. Each experience creates yet another loving embrace that nurtures and sustains our loved ones in this generation and for generations to come.

PASSOVER AND JUSTICE

Judaism has a vision of justice here and now that demands freedom from oppression and an relentless aspiration for a future that is better and more just than the present. The liberation of the Israelites from Egypt is core to the biblical conception of justice.

As we gather around the Seder table, we recount our journey from slavery to freedom. We recognize that our people's liberation was not achieved in any single moment, but rather it happened gradually over 40 years in the desert and it continues to unfold for each of us today.

As we sing Dayenu, we recall our redemption from Egypt, the splitting of the sea, the care with which God sustained us in the wilderness, and ultimately, the giving of the Torah and our arrival in the land of Israel. And although we express gratitude for each moment—it would have been enough—we know that, in fact, all were necessary. Had the journey ended with the leaving of Egypt, we would not be free people today.

Let us draw from the example of Dayenu and reach out our hands to support these communities through every step to recovery. The following is a Dayenu written by a colleague:

**If the world responds only to the cries of the wounded, but does not stay to help them heal...
*It will not be enough.***

**If we empower our brothers and sisters to rise out of the rubble, but desert them when it's time to rebuild...
*It will not be enough.***

**If our generosity supports the needs of today, but forsakes the needs of tomorrow...
*It will not be enough.***

**However, if we sustain our support until stability, peace and independence have been attained...
*Dayenu! Then it will be enough.***

May the ongoing nature of our own story remind us of the continuing need to help others in their struggle to attain true freedom.

You shall tell your child on that day saying, 'It is because of this that Adonai did for me, when I left Egypt.'

Preparing Our Homes For Pesach Bedikat Chametz Removing Leavened Food From Our Homes

It is written in the Torah: No leaven shall be found in your houses for seven days. For whoever eats what is leavened, that person shall be spiritually cut off from the assembly of Israel. . . You shall eat nothing leavened. Rather, wherever you dwell, you shall eat matzah (Exodus 12:19-20).

When our ancestors escaped from Egypt they did not have time to allow their dough to rise. Matzah, unleavened bread became a symbol of freedom and an essential part of the Passover experience. Removing all leavened products from our homes is a time-honored ritual. By cleaning our homes from leaven (chametz) we signal that we are ready for Passover. It is akin to saying:

“Just as my ancestors went without chametz, we, too, will not possess chametz. As they ate matzah, so will we eat matzah. Their redemption we will tell by reading the Haggadah and holding a Seder because their story is our story!”

Here is the ritual for removing the leavened products:

Before searching for and gathering all the chametz, we say the following blessing which declares our intention to fulfill the mitzvah from the Torah.

ברוך אתה יי אלהינו מלך העולם, אשר קדשנו במצותיו, וצונו על בעור חמץ

Barukh Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melekh ha:olam, asher kideshanu b'mitzvotav, v'tzivanu al bee'ur chametz.

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of the universe, who has sanctified us with Your commandments and commanded us concerning the removal of leaven. Next, gather all the leavened products, e.g. bread, cookies, pasta, flour, beer and liquor, etc.* Then, either destroy the leaven products by burning, throwing them out, or hiding them as non-possession, and say:

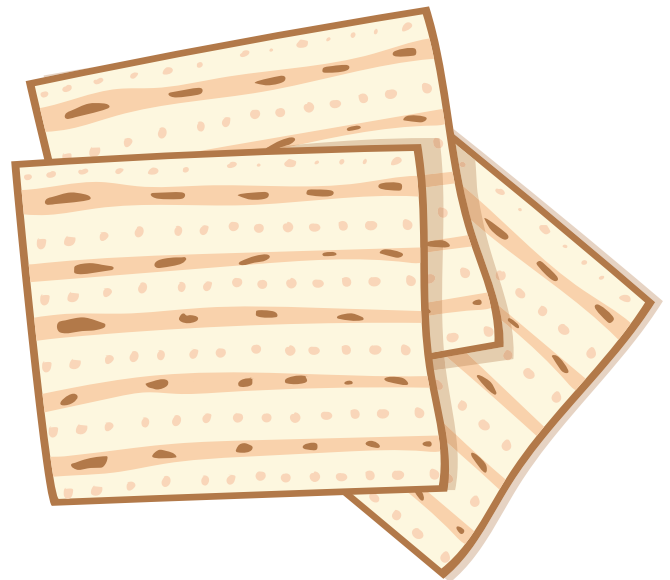
כל חמירא וחמיעה דאכא ברשותי דלא חמתה ודלא בערתה ודלא ידענא
לה לבטל ולהוי הפקר כעפרא דארעא

Any kind of leaven in my possession which has escaped my notice, and which I have not removed, shall be regarded as nonexistent or as mere dust of the earth.

This year the search and removal of chametz from our homes is done on Friday, April 11.

*Many Ashkenazi families do not eat corn, rice, and legumes during Passover.

Technically, these are not chametz and need not be removed. Whether you eat corn, rice and legumes during Passover should be based on your family's custom.

Passover Ritual

“If it is a mitzvah to remove chametz (leavened products) from our homes before Passover, then what exactly is chametz?”

Chametz is food made from leavened grain. In the Torah it is written: "Seven days you shall eat matzah; on the very first day you shall remove leaven from your houses..." (Exodus 12:15). The rabbis specified five grains which can become chametz: wheat, barley, spelt, rye, and oats. Products from these grains cannot be eaten during Pesach unless the flour produced from them is mixed with water and cooked within an 18-minute period.

Many rabbinic authorities in Eastern Europe (Ashkenazi) added to the list of restricted food stuffs. They forbade rice and legumes (these are called kitniyot and include beans, peas, lentils, and corn). Sephardic authorities, prohibit only the five specified grains, thus Sephardic Jews are allowed to eat legumes and rice during Passover. Conservative and Reform rabbinic authorities encourage each family to establish its own custom concerning the eating of rice and legumes. However, Jews of all denominations strictly avoid eating leavened products from the five grains.

On the days before Pesach, the house is thoroughly cleaned and chametz is gathered. The final “search” for chametz should be conducted the evening before Passover. On the morning of Passover, the last remaining pile of chametz is destroyed. The prayers to be recited are found at the front of most Passover Haggadot. The essential declaration is as follows:

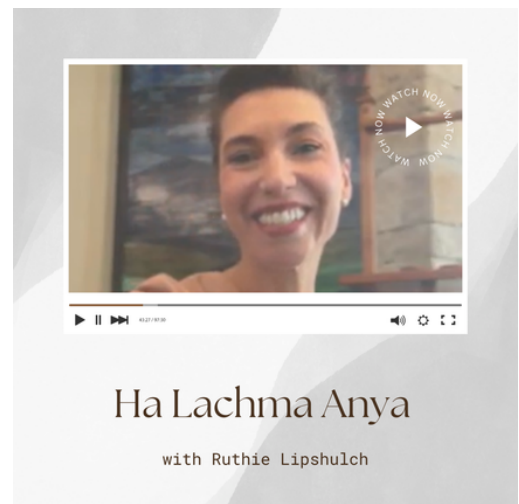
Any chametz which is in my possession which I did or did not see, which I did or did not remove, shall be nullified and become ownerless, like the dust of the earth.”

“But if grain products are forbidden, how can we eat matzah seeing that it is made from grain?”

Of course, matzah is made from grain. However, the wheat and flour for matzah is not given a chance to rise. Thus, it is essential that the grain used for making Passover matzah be kept perfectly dry. Once the flour for matzah has been mixed with water it must be put in the oven and baked within 18 minutes. After the baking, matzah can then be ground into meal and soaked in liquid for as long as you want.

“Why is peanut oil permitted while peanuts are not?”

Peanut oil is considered Kosher for Passover because it isn't absolutely certain that peanuts are forbidden. Halakhic authorities maintain that peanuts are not kitniyot (see above) and that Ashkenazic Jews abstain from them simply on the basis of minhag (i.e. “custom”). So while peanuts are off-limits for Ashkenazic Jews, peanut derivatives are permitted. There are differences of opinion concerning peanut butter. Some consider it like peanuts, others say it is more like oil. As my teacher Dr. Mark Washofsky says: “Spread it on matzah and you take your chances... in more ways than one!”

Avot is a compilation of the ethical teachings and maxims from Rabbinic Jewish tradition. It is unique in two ways: it is the only Mishnah tractate that deals solely with ethical principles, and it is the only Mishnah tractate that does not appear in either the Jerusalem or the Babylonian Talmud. Avot consists of five chapters dated from the time of Simon the Just (c. 160 BCE) to Judah HaNasi (c. 200CE). There is also a sixth chapter that is a repeat of a section from tractate Kallah; it is added to Avot because its content and style are similar to that in Avot. We do believe that all will enjoy this very interesting section of the Oral Law.

Temple Sinai extends a **heartfelt 90th birthday 'Mazel Tov' to Osi Sladek**, who continues to speak publicly about his childhood survival of the Holocaust including recent and upcoming engagements at Denver Academy, Centaurus High School, Foxridge Academy, Regis High School, Thomas Jefferson High School, Vista Ridge High School, and more. In 1974, a fledgling Temple Sinai, operating out of offices on University Boulevard and holding services at the First Plymouth Congregational Church on Hampden Ave., hired Osi as its first full-time Executive Director. The growing congregation soon embarked on a campaign to secure land and construct its first building on Dartmouth Avenue. Over the next two decades, Osi worked side by side with Rabbi Raymond A. Zwerin, steering the congregation through good times and bad, including the construction and loss of the first building, the acquisition of Pitts Elementary School, and its transformation into the first-class synagogue facility that exists today. In 1984, Temple Sinai honored him for his dedication and service to the congregation. If you're a longtime member of Temple Sinai, you remember Osi leading the congregation in song at the start of nearly every Shabbat service over a period of 14 years. Osi and his beautiful wife Selma (Temple Sinai's 2018 Annual Dinner Honorees and the establishment of the Osi & Selma Sladek Cultural Arts & Music Fund...) are also now celebrating their **66th wedding anniversary** and remain ever-present and active in the Denver Jewish community: inspiring, educating, entertaining, and continuing to make their children and grandchildren very proud. Their children are Ron, Adena, Daniel and Michael (together with their spouses) and they have seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Osi's newly-published, gripping memoir **Escape To The Tatras - A Boy, A War and A Life Interrupted** is now available (book & audiobook) at Amazon / Audible.
