This July marks the beginning of the 21st year of our Shabbat Morning Minyan. This unique service is held every Shabbat morning at 9:00 AM and reflects the commitment and dedication of our Temple Sinai members to provide a regular Shabbat morning worship. While Rabbi Shields, Cantorial Soloist Ruthie Lipshulch, and I attend and often lead the Shabbat morning service, they are frequently led by Temple Sinai members. In addition, it is quite common for lay leaders to read the weekly Torah and Haftarah portions and share their own D'var Torah, the interpretation and message of the readings.

Our Shabbat morning service is designed to encourage members to participate and to share their voices. It is an empowering and exhilarating experience that creates a social and spiritual bond to this community and to God. What a thrill it is to watch a first timer lead the service or read a passage from the Torah!

This is also a fabulous opportunity for students who are preparing to become B'nei Mitzvah to become more comfortable and confident with Shabbat liturgy. You should see the parents and grandparents beam with pride when a student comes up to help lead a part of the service!

Over just this past year, not including the Rabbis or our Soloist, we have had 20 different people lead the service or read from the weekly Torah or Haftarah portions. Each in turn has inspired others to develop their confidence as service and Torah leaders. Many others have taken the time to practice so they can lead and teach in fulfillment of a spiritual goal. By participating in the service, lay leaders discover that all of us are shareholders, co-owners of the Torah and our ancestral worship. Each person has a spiritual voice and perspective that enriches our community.

Even those who do not want to lead a service still find great spiritual fulfillment by attending the service. All experience a significant improvement in their knowledge and appreciation of Jewish worship. There is no better way to sharpen your Hebrew prayer skills! It is not surprising that those who studied to become Adult B'nei Mitzvah have

found a friendly and joyous home at our Shabbat morning service.

As we enter our 21st year, all of us who treasure the Shabbat Morning Minyan reach out to you to and extend a warm welcome to you and your loved ones to join us for a special Shabbat experience. I assure you that all who do will find an extraordinary group of new friends and a closer relationship to God.

Attention: Parents and Grandparents- Confirmation at Temple Sinai

We are planning a meaningful year for our Confirmation class that will build friendships, strengthen Jewish identity, help teens feel more connected to our Temple Sinai community, and prepare them for Jewish life in college. It is an opportunity to come together with Jewish peers and explore Judaism spiritually and intellectually in greater depth.

Being Jewish is not always easy, and our teens have and will come to know that. Last year's group found that having that group of trusted

peers who then became friends was meaningful and helpful. There was a safe and sacred space at Temple Sinai that provided a chance to take a breath and just, "be."

We have learned that teens want to be engaged in worthwhile activities and not feel we are "wasting their time." We strive to be as flexible as possible and believe our past Confirmation classes felt this was an engaging and valuable experience and were glad they made the commitment.

Lastly, Temple Sinai is committed to helping all participants in Confirmation travel to Israel in the coming years. Stability will return, and there is no better way to get to know Israel than to visit. To that end, we wanted to remind you of the Jewish Continuation Study Grant that many Sinai students received as a B'nei Mitzvah for \$1,000 toward participation in the Joyce Zeff Israel Study Tour (IST) NFTY in Israel, or another Israel teen tour. We will extend this grant to all participants in Confirmation.

We hope you will encourage the teens in your life (rising 10th-12th grade are eligible) to participate.

THE REVEREND, DR. STUART HASKINS

RABBI RAY ZWERIN

At the Memorial service for the late Reverend Dr. Stuart Haskins, Rabbi Ray Zwerin offered the following tribute. Rev. Haskins led First Plymouth UCC for many years and it was his generosity that provided Temple Sinai our first home. Rabbi Zwerin's moving eulogy provides a fascinating look back to our founding years and the importance of interfaith relations.

I began Temple Sinai in 1967 just as Rev. Haskins arrived in Denver to become pastor of 1st Plymouth. With a membership of a few dozen families ... but growing rapidly, we were in great need of a place in which to hold our worship services and religious school classes. One of our members had a neighbor who knew the Haskins and he was gracious in making the introductions. We met here at the church and about five minutes into our conversation, "Reverend" and "Rabbi" morphed into "Stu" and "Ray," and a fascinating many decades long relationship was born.

In a way, it can be said that both the Reverend and the Rabbi started at First Plymouth at the same time. The lovely chapel became our sanctuary for Friday night and Saturday morning worship services. Our Holy Ark was made out of electric blue fiberglass and had a white curtain. It was on wheels and was rolled into the chapel for a service and then and rolled out and stored in the hallway behind the chapel during the week. Our ushers referred to the process as "parking the Torahs." That space was perfect for our growing congregation. It embraced the usual 125 attendees perfectly and if more arrived, then chairs were set up in the hallway beyond to hold the overflow.

Stuart offered us the main sanctuary for our large High Holy Day services. We had no idea how many people to expect that September, but for sure the chapel would be too small. That first Rosh Hashanah eve we were stunned to see that over 650 people attended. I guess word of a new synagogue got around. Members and guests filled this downstairs area and the balcony was also at near capacity. We were thinking that we'd have to set chairs out in the Narthex if more kept arriving, but the sanctuary sufficed. Narthex was a new word

for me. Latin 101 is not usually part of the Rabbinical school curriculum. At the Temple we call such a space the lobby, which ironically is also of Latin origin.

As the worshipers settled into their places for the first time in this lovely space, I knew that many

were a bit unsettled. These people were for the most part strangers to each other as well as to me. They were also strangers to this space, but strangest of all to a Jewish congregation readying itself to participate in the holiest of Jewish occasions was the large cross front and center. There simply aren't many of those in a synagogue. So I opened the service by welcoming members and guests to our first High Holy Day services, invited all to participate in the readings and to join with the choir in singing ... oh, and as for the cross, I know how that can be a bit disconcerting for some of us ... so just think of it as a "T" for Temple. The laughter that ensued defused the tension and immediately unified the entire gathering. When Stu called to ask how those first services went, I shared that story with him. He roared. I heard him retell it several times, and was told that he enjoyed recalling it over and again.

Sukkot is our biblical holiday of the ingathering of the fall harvest. It's celebrated by erecting a temporary booth – a sukkah, that is decorated with symbols of the fall season and the fruits and grains of the field. The week long holiday begins just four days after Yom Kippur. Stuart asked if we were going to build a sukkah and when I told him that one of our members offered to build one that could be assembled and then stored to reassemble each year, he said, "Look, I'll make you a deal. You can put up the sukkah in the courtyard, if you'll come by on the Sunday during the holiday, and take our children and those adults who wish, into it and teach us all about Sukkot." Dozens of parents with their kids came into the sukkah, heard the blessings recited for the occasion, and participated in the waving of the lulav – the three branches, and the smelling the etrog – the special citron, and asked a myriad of questions. Now, that for me was too much fun.

So, now we had Jews worshiping in a Christian space and Christians sharing in a Jewish space. To keep the sharing going, my very gracious friend proposed a joint study class. We announced a Bible study course taught by both of us to both congregations. First course, the Book of Genesis. Begin at the beginning seemed about right. The surprisingly large turnout from both congregations continued for years. We both looked forward to that Wednesday morning class that went for 8-10 weeks each fall and winter. I always enjoyed Rev. Haskin's takes on biblical verses. We had lots of humorous bantering back and forth as we interpreted verses. There are times when we could picture Moses holding his head and downing aspirin. 7

Of course, our first Thanksgiving here was a shared service. It's not unusual for two or more churches to share in that service or for several synagogues to do so, but it's a bit more unusual, though it shouldn't be, for a church and a synagogue to pray together. Then we did it again the next year and the next until by now our two congregations have shared in the annual Thanksgiving service for 57 consecutive years and still maintain that tradition. I am told that no two such different faith congregations have shared in this service continually for that long in the history of our country! Now that is something to take note of, not so much with pride, but rather with a sense of honor ... for an honor it is to share with one other in giving thanks for our manifold blessings.

Speaking of Moses and aspirin, one of my favorite Stuart Haskin's stories took place in Israel. About 25 years ago, wife Rikki and I were planning our Temple's 23rd or 24th annual trip to Israel. At the same time, Stu and I met for lunch. The conversation turned to Israel and he mentioned that he and Kat had been there decades ago and would love to go back. To which I responded with an enthusiastic, "We now have about 20 couples signed up; why don't you get 20 or so families and we'll all go together." Sure enough, within no time at all, we had a very large contingent of tourists to the Holy Land. The tour was sensational. Every day was filled to capacity with unusual places to visit, Jewish and Christian sights to see, guest speakers from government and universities. Happy tourists, happy ministers.

On one of our evenings in Jerusalem, I mentioned to the group that Rikki and I were planning to go to a Middle Eastern restaurant in the Arab section of the city. It was an open night without other plans and about 20 people opted to come along. I made the reservations.

It was a full moon, a beautiful summer evening, and the Haskins joined us as we walked the 20-30 minutes from hotel to restaurant. Couples were chatting up a storm as we walked along, and Stuart and I were particularly happy to see that everyone was mixing together with ease and smiles. The meal was delicious. We were sated, stuffed, overfed. A walk back to the hotel was mandated. I began to lead the march home, when Stu remarked that he recognized the area and that he was pretty sure that he knew the way back to the hotel. I made the announcement: "Ladies and gentlemen, I am pleased to announce that a new Moses will lead us back to our hotel rooms." Slight applause, and Stu set out. After the first block, I whispered that he might want to turn right and go back to the

restaurant so that he could set out in the correct direction. "No, I'm okay," he said, "I'm taking a different route. I know the way."

In all honesty, I really enjoyed the walk. We went through neighborhoods that few tourists ever get to see. We walked through the ultra-Orthodox section called Meah Sha'arim, which means 100 gates; we went through the Greek section, the German Colony, Rehavia, we skirted Rikki's old neighborhood and the open air market place called Machaneh Yehudah ... and after about two hours, and noting a bit of restlessness in the wandering multitude, he turned to the group of weary wanderers, smiled and said something like. "I did the hard stuff, I plowed the field, now I'll let the Rabbi put the horses in the barn."

For the rest of the trip, he was called Moses – kindly, and lovingly, and he accepted it with such good humor.

Jerusalem may have changed a lot since the Haskins had been there last, but our relationship never did. We were hosted in this special building for nine years, until we completed the building of our first temple. While we were here and ever since we left, my fondness and appreciation for this man of principles ... and values ... and integrity and ... passion for his faith ... and for the welfare of others didn't change or waver either. I doubt that our congregation's beginning would have been so seamless without the help of this lovely congregation and it's guiding spiritual leader. To First Plymouth, he was indeed your Moses for some 27 years, and he never lost his way, never led you astray.

And for me, personally, he was a ... blessing – a valued friend, a respected colleague, a listening ear, a wise counselor. I am indeed honored to attend the memorial of his life with our friends at First Plymouth. To his dear Kat and his children, to relatives and friends and mourning congregants go our sincere condolences. The Reverend Stuart Haskins: his service to church and community was exceptional, and his personal friendship ... indelible and irreplaceable.

Tiyeh nishmato ... May his soul be bound up in the bond of eternal life.

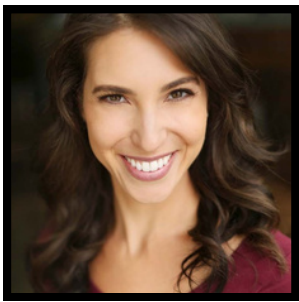

TEEN LEARNING AND MADRICHIM PROGRAM 2025-2026

Thank you for another incredible Religious School year. Please attend the June 8 Temple Sinai Annual Dinner which will spotlight and support the Religious School.

Many families have already registered for the 2025-2026 school year and have received classroom assignments! [Please Register so we can complete those assignments and better prepare for the year ahead.](#)

I wanted to provide you with a brief summary of the 8th-10th grade learning and leadership options for the coming year. More detailed information will be sent out in the next three weeks.

Teen Learning and Leadership

Confirmation [10th grade]

Our 2025 Confirmands attended our 57th annual Confirmation retreat and led a deeply meaningful Shabbat service for the entire congregation. Our Sinai teens shared reflections and insights on their Jewish journeys up to this point.

We can't wait to initiate our 2026 Confirmation class experience. We will be meeting on a combination of Wednesdays and Sundays. This allows for maximum participation by students. We understand student schedules can fluctuate.

Confirmands will engage concepts from Mussar, a Jewish spiritual practice that gives concrete guidance on how to develop and live a meaningful, intentional, and ethical life; when we cultivate inner virtues in a safe space, we improve ourselves. Guest educators will complement our Mussar practice. Occasional off-site trips are designed to broaden our exposure to what it means to be Jewish in the modern world.

9th Grade

9th graders will meet on Wednesday evenings, and will be engaged in creative group learning interspersed with guest educators and occasional trips. They will build upon their lessons with Rabbi Bobbie from this past year.

8th Grade

8th graders will be learning together on Sundays. They will be engaged in experiential and project based learning throughout the year, and will have important time to further concretize peer connections. 8th grade is an essential year after students complete their b'nei mitzvah journeys to figure out what it means to be responsible members of the Jewish community and find a place within that community.

Madrachim

Are you an aspiring leader in 8th - 12th grades? Do you enjoy being at Temple Sinai Religious School on Sunday? Do you enjoy working with kids? Have you always wanted to support teachers in creating incredible learning experiences? [Apply to the madrichim program!](#)

THE FOUR PILLARS OF ENGAGEMENT

I am celebrating my first anniversary as Temple Sinai's Director of Engagement and Programs - and I LOVE it here. I experienced an entire Jewish Cycle of holidays and immersed myself in this community. I met and connected with so many members. I did my best to listen to your needs and trusted my own instincts about ways to help connect congregants to Judaism and to each other. I have the best mentor in Lisa Thorner, who was the Program Director here for 14 years. I also have the support of our incredible rabbis and staff - it is truly a wonderful synagogue to work for.

Last June, Lisa told me that I needed to join **PEP-RJ** - the organization of 'Programming and Engagement Professionals of Reform Judaism'. Membership affords me benefits throughout the year with online networking, learning opportunities, brainstorming programming ideas, and sharing best practices, etc. Once a year, we gather in person for a conference to learn, share, and network in more depth - which was in Chicago from March 1-4 this year.

My biggest take-away is that Temple Sinai is already a welcoming congregation AND we can do more to be intentional about engagement.

The four pillars of engagement are:

- **Noticed** - Everyone wants to be acknowledged - because everyone matters.
- **Named** - Everyone wants people to know their names. They also want to know others' names - and not feel embarrassed if they forget, etc.
- **Known** - Beyond naming people, people want others to know a little bit about them AND they want to know things about others too.

- **Needed** - People want to be a part of something - when people are needed, they help build the community as opposed to someone building the community for them.

The summer months afford me a little extra time to focus on the bigger vision and I am ready to create three new committees.

- **Together at Sinai:** An Engagement Committee that will help Temple Sinai create a Strategic Plan focusing on these four pillars of engagement. This plan will include strategies to strengthen membership onboarding, creating an inclusive practice at events and recognizing demographic groups we are not reaching.
- **L'Dor V'Dor:** An Intergenerational Committee who want to help plan and execute special moments and experiences for ALL the generations of congregants to connect to each other and strengthen their Jewish identity.
- **The Tradition Kitchen:** A Jewish Food Committee who wants to create programs where we cook, learn how to make, and eat Jewish food.

Babylonian Talmud. Avot consists of five chapters dated from the time of Simon the Just (c. 160 BCE) to Judah HaNasi (c. 200CE). There is also a sixth chapter that is a repeat of a section from tractate Kallah; it is added to Avot because its content and style are similar to that in Avot.

We do believe that all will enjoy this very interesting section of the Oral Law.

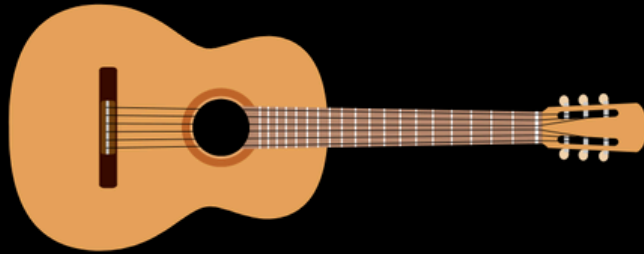

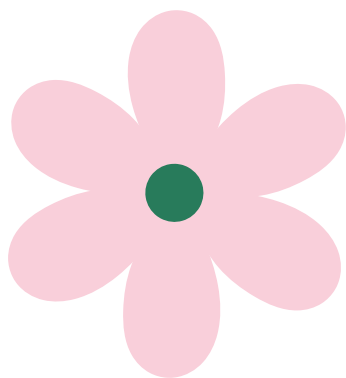
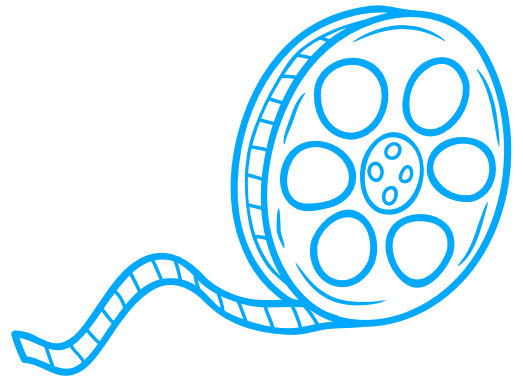

KENDALL TAPPAN - JUNE, 14, 2025

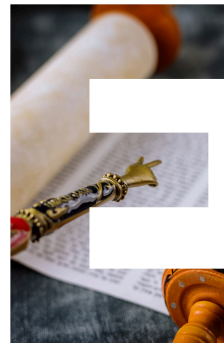

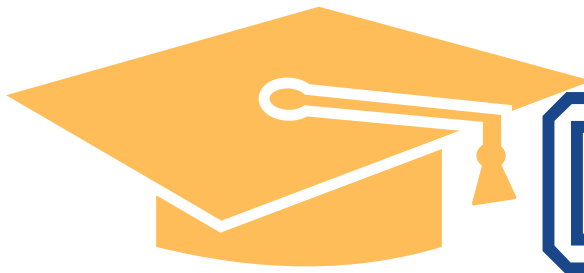


MATEO ZEIGER - JUNE, 21, 2025

TREE OF LIFE

The Tree of Life sculpture was created by the renowned synagogue artist Sanford Werfel. The branches of the tree form the Hebrew words "Etz Chaim." The stones at the roots of the Tree are symbolic of the Twelve Tribes of Israel. The golden leaves and stones may be inscribed to highlight or commemorate joyous occasions, including births, weddings, anniversaries, graduations or to honor family, parents or friends. Cost: \$175 to inscribe a leaf and \$1,000 to inscribe a stone.
